Armistice Day Act of Remembrance

The Sicklinghall Village Act of Remembrance was once again held on Armistice Day, Tuesday 11 November. Whilst the intention was to hold it at the War Memorial in the Sicklinghall cemetery, due to the inclement weather it was held within St Peter's Church.

Once again it was excellently attended, with over 40 people in the congregation. Mrs Catherine Catton and Mr Peter Owthwaite were both resplendent wearing their fathers' military medals, and personal medals were worn by others.

The service was led by Mr John Barnes, who opened proceedings with some words of welcome and reflections on Armistice Day. Our formal service commenced with a *Prayer for Peace* delivered by Revd Stroma McDermott. The pupils of Sicklinghall County Primary School then recited *We Shall Keep the Faith*, a poem written by Moina Michael

Mr Derek Plows read out the names of the fallen, followed by the poem *For the Fallen* by Laurence Binyon. The Last Post was followed by a two-minute silence at 11:00 am and followed by Reveille, the music being supplied by Mrs Jean Brady.

Wreaths were then placed in front of the altar by Mrs Mary Campbell on behalf of the Church of St Mary Immaculate, by Mrs Liz Boyd on behalf of St Peter's Church and by Mr John Leahy on behalf of the Sicklinghall Parish Council. The children of Sicklinghall School then placed their hand painted remembrance rocks, followed by those in attendance placing individual wooden remembrance crosses, many inscribed with the names of family members who gave their lives in the Great Wars or who served in them and are no longer with us.

The Lord's Prayer was recited by all, which was followed by some poignant closing words and blessing by Father Andrew Summersgill. The service concluded with the dismissal by Revd Stroma McDermott.

The wreaths, personal memorial crosses and remembrance stones were moved to the village War Memorial the following day, where they remain for all to view.

There will be a similar service next year on Wednesday 11 November 2026 at 10:50am

News from All Saints'

February, March it's an odd time of year. Already we're anticipating springtime, but our reality is winter still. With that in mind, I'm going to offer you a bit of both, a little 'backwards and forwards'.

Did you get tickets for the KODS November panto, Cinderella? You did? Then you don't need me to tell you that this winter's festive production was an absolute winner, the best costumes, the biggest laughs, and the world's cutest pantomime horse. They sang, they danced, they gave it their all. What a team they were! Bravo to everyone involved in this very successful production. We, the audience, loved it!

Mid-December, older residents enjoyed the village's annual Christmas lunch in church. It's a privilege to be invited to share lunch with neighbours and to be musically entertained by the children from our village school. I have no idea how Lucy Crack and her team of kitchen wizards managed to serve us a roast dinner, Christmas pudding and drinks, around 80 covers, in a church with no cooking facilities. What I can say is that pupils from the school carried hot plates to our tables with efficiency and charm. Many thanks to all concerned. We, the diners, enjoyed the event immensely. A collection to cover catering costs raised a surplus, which alongside funds raised from other village events, enabled the village to donate over £600 to the Food Mission at St Peter's, working to feed hungry people in the Harrogate area. What a great result, being able to share our good fortune in such a worthwhile way.

In addition, many of you responded to the appeal for little bags of treats to be handed out to clients at St Peter's following their own Christmas lunch. Twenty festive bags were delivered to St Peter's, along with generous grocery donations for the weekly mini-supermarket which is open at St Peter's to anyone in need. When you're in church, I hope you'll take a look at the letter of thanks from St Peter's - it's pinned on the notice board.

Our next and most-loved event on the Sunday before Christmas was All Saints' annual carol concert. Once again audience demand exceeded supply, seats were quickly taken. Whilst the concert's history extends over more than three decades, this year's concert was by general consensus one of the best ever. All credit to our musical director, Will Lewis, to the talented soloists, Chris Bigsby and Gerri Elliot, to visiting musicians, David Butcher (keyboards) and Cherry Bratkowski (percussion), and of course to the loyal choir members who rehearsed right through the autumn to bring us a well-paced and lively programme of seasonal music. The charity collection at the concert, combined with the on-line All Saints Christmas appeal, raised £1,700.00 for the Forget Me Not children's hospice. You donated most generously. Big thanks to you all.

And then there was the traditional Christmas Eve crib service, telling the Christmas story. However, it was far from traditional, with famous characters from the film *Wicked*, Glinda and Elphaba, adding colour (green), sparkle and glamour to the telling of the story, and not forgetting the talking donkey. A big thankyou to all who took part and brought the story to life.

With the celebrations of Christmas now behind us, we enter a more reflective period in preparation for Lent. **Ash Wednesday** marks the beginning of Lent, and a special community service involving the school will be held in church on **15 February at 2.45pm**. Curate Emma James and Moira will lead us, and you're warmly invited. **Mothering Sunday** this year falls on **15 March** and Emma and Moira will be back with us again to lead Family Service on that day, starting at 11.00am, with refreshments from 10.30am. We all have a mother, and maybe you're a mother yourself. In any event please come and join us as we continue the age-old tradition of flowers picked for our church, and for and in memory of all our mothers.

Palm Sunday 29 March brings a special Benefice Service, Family Communion, to be held at All Saints' at the **earlier start time of 10.00am**. If all goes well, Revd Stroma, Emma and Moira will have a donkey to help them re-enact the history as we reflect on Jesus' peaceful entry into Jerusalem at the beginning of Holy Week, the final week of Lent. *(NB We 'spring' forward into British Summer Time this weekend.)*

The church is open daily from around 10.00am until dusk if you'd like to enjoy a quiet moment. If on the other hand you prefer 'busy', homemade cake and coffee with company are served on the first Wednesday of each month 9.30am to 11.30am. It's a great opportunity to chat and relax, share and catch up with the news, all for the price of a voluntary donation in support of the upkeep of our lovely church.

Before I sign off, may I enquire about New Year's resolutions? Did we manage to sort out the sock drawer? Are we eating more greens? Recycling more? Or did we simply resolve to be kind? Kindness is never wasted.

From the Rector

At this moment, I'm hunkering down in the office trying to stay inside to avoid storm Goretti that's currently blasting in. Winter has certainly arrived. So I'm quite excited to be writing something for February and March and thinking about how seasons can change so quickly, and looking forward to Spring. If we look closely we see signs of hope; bulbs are already pushing through the cold ground, snowdrops appear almost unnoticed at first, lambing time edges closer, the Christmas decorations might be down but it's getting lighter in the afternoons.

It may be cold, icy and windy but already we are having conversations with couples about their summer weddings. Things move on don't they?

In the church calendar, February brings us Candlemas, the feast that marks the presentation of Jesus in the Temple. It's a moment that can easily be overlooked, but it holds something deeply precious. Simeon and Anna, two elderly figures who have waited faithfully for years, finally see what they have long hoped for: the light of God coming into the world. They welcome the child with gladness and I'm delighted that we are again celebrating Candlemas at St Wilfrid's, as we also have a new service there to welcome in families and children.

Light is such a powerful image at this time of year. We are all weary of darkness by February, dark mornings, dark evenings, and sometimes dark news that weighs heavily on our hearts. Yet Candlemas reminds us that God's light does not wait for perfect conditions. It shines into ordinary, imperfect, even difficult circumstances. God's light opens up new possibilities, allows things to grow and promotes new life. Hope doesn't arrive with a fanfare; it often comes quietly, held gently in waiting arms for those who have eyes to see it.

February and March are months of Lenten reflection as we pause and consider again Jesus' journey to the cross, a time to ask simple but important questions: Where have I noticed light recently? Who has helped me see hope when I struggled to find it myself? And how might I be a small bearer of that light to others? In our small communities, light often shows itself in very practical ways: neighbours checking in on one another, meals shared, lifts offered, conversations held at the gate or over a cup of tea, offering to pray for someone. These moments matter more than we sometimes realise. They are reflections of God's care, lived out in everyday faithfulness.

As we move towards Spring, my prayer is that we would have eyes to notice the light already among us, to see God's love at work in the small details of a friendly 'hello' or a glimpse of the first snowdrops and then the colour and bold bloom of the daffodils. And of course, there is and will always be a warm welcome and the promise of God's light for you across our benefice churches which we'd love to share with you.

Warmest wishes for 2026, and here's to another year of appreciating life in our beautiful village. I have recently stepped into the role of chair of the Village Association, following fifteen years of dedicated service from John Hopkins. Thank you, John.

I wanted to use this first newsletter of the year as an opportunity to remind residents of the Association's role and, importantly, to encourage more of you to get involved.

The Almscliffe Villages Community Association was originally formed over fifteen years ago and holds charitable status. Its aim is: *To raise funds for the provision of facilities or other leisure-time activities for all age groups which improve quality of life and experiences, and promote social, cultural and heritage activities within a rural community.* AVCA was initially formed to support all the villages in our surrounding area. However, over time, activity has focused on North Ripton due to the continued interest and commitment of residents in our village.

The first project the Association undertook in 2010 was the successful fundraising of over £40,000 for the installation of a peal of six bells at St John's Church. Since then, the Association has led a range of fundraising activities to support our community garden, the village school and church, as well as local charities such as St Michael's Hospice and Harrogate Young Carers. The Summer Gala remains a key fundraising activity, closely partnered with the Parish Council, where Association members support the planning and delivery of this popular event.

We meet formally only once a year (at The Square and Compass pub), with additional meetings held as needed to manage specific projects or finalise planning for the Gala. Getting involved is therefore not onerous, but it *does* make a real difference - helping to strengthen community connections, supporting local initiatives and ensuring the Association continues to reflect the needs of village life.

We are especially keen to hear from both long-standing residents and those who are newer to the village. Fresh perspectives are invaluable, and getting involved is a great way to meet people, share ideas and play a small part in shaping the future of our community.

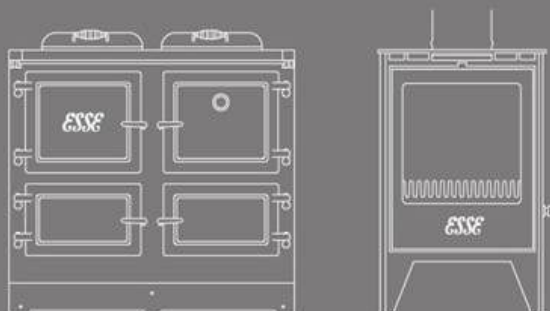
North Rigton Parish Council

When Colin, a friend who has been absent, comes back to his circle of friends, his friends are worried about how to approach him over the death of his fiancée, Carol, who has drowned. Diana organizes a tea party for Colin's arrival. The characters are shown to have inter-relationship tensions and this is near erupting when Colin arrives, heightening the tension when they all work to appear friendly towards him. However Colin seems euphorically happy while the rest of the party are near breaking point

Diana is concerned in Act I regarding whether her husband (Paul) is faithful or not. Deep down, she knows he is not and has a feeling he is having a love affair with Evelyn. Evelyn's husband, John, is in business with Paul and knows that Paul and Evelyn have slept together but doesn't say anything, in fear of damaging business relations. The play unfolds and Colin's arrival triggers Diana's confrontation. She ends up pouring the cream on Paul and breaking down at the end of the play.

The play premiered on 17 June 1974 at the Library Theatre, Scarborough, before opening in the West End the following year, and has been regularly revived since, making it one of the most popular plays in the Ayckbourn play canon.

103 years of history

The Weeton and Huby Players' first performance, Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, was performed to the local community in 1922. Whilst there are some gaps in our records from the first 30 years, this will be our 139th known play. Long may it continue.

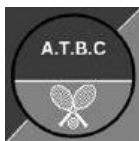
