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# A Recipe from CookFoodFan

#### **Sweet Endings**

I haven't done a sweet recipe for a while so thought I would do this one. Soft stewed cherries, apple and vanilla topped with buttery maple oats and dark chocolate. Yum! I like using frozen fruits as they are good value and nutritious, a great alternative to fresh ones and this recipe is less calorific than a lot of dessert recipes.

### **Cherry Chocolate Crisp** (serves 4)

1 cooking apple, peeled, cored and chopped
250g frozen pitted cherries
1 tsp vanilla extract
50ml boiling water
2 tbsp pure maple syrup
1 tbsp melted unsalted butter
80g porridge oats
50g dark chocolate (70 per cent cocoa solids), finely chopped
Pinch of ground cinnamon
Pinch of salt

- 1. Heat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas mark 7.
- 2. Put the apple, cherries, vanilla extract and boiling water in a saucepan and simmer for 10 mins until the apples and cherries are soft. Stir and smash them together while they cook.
- 3. In a bowl mix the melted butter and maple syrup. Add the porridge oats and a pinch of salt, stir well then add the chocolate bits and mix in.
- 4. Put the cherry mix into a small baking dish (a 20cm one), then top with the oats. Sprinkle over the cinnamon.
- 5. Place into the oven and bake for 8 mins until the oats are golden.
- 6. Serve with cream, custard, Greek yoghurt or vanilla ice cream.

#### Tip:

# A quick summer dessert recipe is **Baked Nectarines with Cinnamon Honey Sauce**.

Cut nectarines (1 per person) in half and remove stones, put them (cut side up) in a shallow baking dish. Mix 1 tbsp (per nectarine) honey, cinnamon and vanilla extract in a small bowl and drizzle over. Bake at 200C/180C fan/gas mark 6 for 25 mins until the nectarines are soft. Serve with ice cream, the honey sauce and perhaps some roasted hazelnuts for crunch.

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#### The Chatterbox – Hanging on to the Past

In the dark and dusty silence in my mother's attic, is stored a lifetime of memories. Strictly speaking, there are several lifetimes up there as there are items belonging to my late grandmother, late aunty, and my late uncle. Then there are items from my mother's life, my late father's and also many keepsakes and belongings of both mine and my siblings from our younger days.

During my father's lifetime, he was very much a DIY enthusiast and at some point, he decided to partition the attic into separate rooms and each one of them is jam-packed, stuffed to the gunnels, and chockfull of 'memories'. Some of these include ornaments from my grandmother's house which I remember playing with as a child, such as a pottery biscuit barrel in the shape of Romany caravan, a little condiment set made from silver and blue glass and a black, wooden elephant.

There are numerous bags and suitcases crammed with old clothes. There are wedding dresses, several bridesmaid's dresses, toys, books and games, LP records, photographs and mirrors. There are dressing up costumes, gifts that weren't wanted, and stuffed toys. It's a bit like a scene from a car boot sale. There are even three sets of dentures, should anyone find themselves suddenly toothless.

I've had discussions with my mother so many times about the sheer volume of things that really do need to be sorted out up there but it always falls on deaf ears and, since I know the reasons why, I don't insist she starts parting with anything, nor do I take it upon myself to start the task. They are the physical remnants and reminders of my mother's connection to her family and a link to the memories that she keeps inside and, although we laugh about the sets of false teeth, she cannot bear to let these possessions go from her care, or from her life. I understand and accept this and know that during her lifetime, she'll never part with the contents of the attic.

Why do we hold on to these inanimate objects, these symbols of the past? Well, to my mind, it must be because of what or who they represent. I point out to my mother that these "things" are NOT the person and that the person they belonged to lives on forever in our heart and memories. How, then, do I explain to myself why I have never thrown away my children's artistic efforts from infancy or their first pair of shoes or why I have kept some birthday cards from friends that I went to school with? Well, because I too, am holding on to the past, keeping these memories from days-gone-by safe and close, reminding me of times that are impossible to recreate. Times that make me smile, fill me with happiness, and they allow me the opportunity to reminisce.

My siblings and I joke with our mother that after her days, it'll be much simpler to burn the house down as the task awaiting us in the attic will be too big to tackle. However, there's also a part of me that's worried that once I start rummaging around up there and find items that trigger memories of my own, I'll just end up boxing them all up and transporting it to my own attic for ever. 


