Planning Highlights

A parish council is a *statutory consultee*. This means Swindon Borough Council must notify the parish council about planning applications, but the parish council does not have the power to make the final decision to approve or refuse them, that decision is made solely by Swindon Borough Council. The parish council's role is to provide local knowledge, raise concerns or objections, and represent the views of the community. Its comments are considered as part of the decision-making process. The Speed Watch sessions over November and December give a helpful snapshot of where drivers are not sticking to the limit. Lady Lane stands out straight away, with lots of traffic and a noticeable number of people drifting well above 30 mph. Broadbush also appears several times, and while the speeding numbers aren't extreme on any single day, the fact that it keeps coming up suggests it's a road where habits are hard to shift. Ermin Street is a quieter spot overall, but the speeds recorded there are worrying, with some of the highest figures in the whole period. Altogether, these locations feel like the ones where a bit of extra attention or gentle community reminders could genuinely help improve how safe and comfortable residents feel.

Road use across the parish is shifting as new developments come forward, and access routes evolve, and we're seeing the impact of that in the way traffic moves through our community. Having residents involved in Speed Watch makes a genuine difference; your observations help us spot emerging issues early and focus attention where it's most needed. Challenges and areas of focus

We'd like to share more with you. This section offers a few short snippets of what your councilors are currently working on, some positive, some more challenging, but all part of the real day-to-day work of serving our community. We believe in being open about the issues we're tackling, the progress being made, and the areas where we're still pushing for better outcomes. By sharing these updates, we hope to give you a clearer picture of the work happening behind the scenes and the commitment we hope to bring to every task, big or small.

Highways Sign: BPC are not pleased that a directional highways sign has appeared, directing traffic from Tadpole Garden Village into the village despite BPC querying that the Haul Road is not yet adopted by SBC and so Highways signage should not be in place.

Rivan: BPC are asking whether there is a pecuniary interest for Swindon Borough Council in that should this plan be approved, would it attract Carbon Capture funding for them, we know they are promoting Carbon Capture projects currently and would not want this to influence their decision.

High Street: The water leak is now improved in the High Street, the broken pipe and blocked gully has been repaired/cleared.

Back Lane/Front Lane: The leak in this area is still of concern, despite numerous attempts to request investigation with Thames Water they are still not addressing the problem.

Defibrillator for MUGA: BPC would like to express its sincere thanks to the Rapid Relief Team for funding a defibrillator and cabinet for the MUGA. This generous support provides a valuable resource for the whole community. We will now have 5 in the Village.

Ermin Street: Our landscaping project along Ermin Street was completed just before Christmas, supported in part by a £30,000 grant from the Trees for Climate fund. We have planted 4,000 native trees to form a new hedge that will enhance pedestrian access from Ermin Street to the bottom of Blunsdon Hill. Alongside the path, we have added 7,000 native flower bulbs and sown 15kg of native wildflower seed into the grass banks.

Delivering the project on what was once the main trunk road to Cirencester was challenging, particularly due to the number of underground utilities, but the final results have been warmly received. We are grateful to Oliver Saunders, our Project Manager from Bath Land Management and the contractors involved and are now focusing on ongoing maintenance to ensure local people and wildlife benefit from these improvements for many years. We are committed to keeping the village an attractive and pleasant place to live and work.
