



With just a few days of the Autumn term remaining, I would like to share some highlights from a very busy and enjoyable half term.

During November, we celebrated Anti-Bullying Week, with our Behaviour Ambassadors leading a fantastic assembly on the importance of respect, how to treat others kindly, and what to do if you see someone behaving in an unkind way. This year's focus 'Power for Good' highlighted the importance of using your voice. The children learned how their words and actions can make a positive difference and how speaking up can help keep everyone safe and included. We also celebrated everyone being unique, different and special by coming to school wearing odd socks.

Key Stage 1 and Early Years did a wonderful job retelling the Christmas story when they presented *A Wriggly Nativity* to older pupils, family and friends. The children sang, acted and danced beautifully, and it always amazes me how brave and confident our youngest pupils are when performing to such a large audience.

Our choir, Norton Singers, have been very busy over the Christmas period. They performed at the Christmas Activity Morning at St Andrew's Church, and some of our Year 5 and 6 children also visited the residents of Stowlangtoft Hall Care Home to entertain them. Their final performance of the year will be at the Norton Village Carol Service at the Salvation Army.

It was also lovely to see the Salvation Army Hall well attended by family and friends at both of our Carol Services. The children in Key Stage 1 and 2 sang beautifully and shared readings clearly and confidently.

All the children – and I must include the staff – thoroughly enjoyed our PE Enrichment sessions, which focused on learning the words and a dance routine to the song 'Naughty' from *Matilda*.

Continuing with PE, children in Key Stage 2 entered Under-9 and Under-11 Dodgeball competitions against other primary schools in the area. Both teams showed great honesty and enthusiasm throughout their games and were a real credit to the school.

In Rocket Class (Year 4), the children completed a Design and Technology week focusing on making pop-up books. After designing, making and evaluating their books, they had the opportunity to share and read them to Galaxy Class (Year 1), which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

In Meteor Class (Year 5), the children have been particularly enjoying their Art lessons, where the focus has been on weaving. They learned how to use a loom, and the finished pieces were very impressive.

In Star Class (Reception), the children have been busy making Christmas decorations, from weaving stars to creating decorated Christmas trees.

Comet Class combined Food Technology and Maths this half term when they made and decorated cookies. The children measured the ingredients, mixed, stirred and decorated their cookies before enjoying eating them.

In my last newsletter, I shared how Year 2 had written to Buckingham Palace after reading the book *The King's Pants*. I am pleased to report that the class received a reply thanking them for their letter. The response is now proudly on display in the classroom.

Finally, in Supernova Class (Year 6), the children have created some beautiful 3D poppies as part of their Art topic. Using templates, they cut out petal shapes and edged them using blanket stitch. Mrs Sturman, who teaches the class Art, congratulated the children on their perseverance and excellent results.

ELMSWELL GARDEN CLUB JANUARY 2026

Happy New Year! By the time you read this Christmas will seem like a long time ago. Memories of mince pies, Christmas cake, turkey and leftovers will have faded. A new year can herald a new garden or at least tweaks to your current one. Gardens are an ever-evolving adventure and the new year can give us time to plan the year ahead before the spring arrives along with panic buying of seed potatoes, seeds and manic sowing of annuals in February (or is it just me?). This time of year, I like to source or plan to grow plants that can fill borders damaged by frost or snow, extreme waterlogging, drought or those that have just reached the end of their natural life. This year could also be the year to experiment with a new colour of summer bedding, grow that new tomato variety or even attempt a show entry worthy vegetable.

There is surprisingly much to be enjoyed in gardens this time of year including snowdrops, crocus and early daffodils if the winter remains mild. There are also a number of heavenly scented winter flowering shrubs that can stop you in your tracks. My favourites are *Sarcococca* (Winter Box), *Jasminum nudiflorum*, *Hamamelis* (Witch Hazel) and *Chimonanthus* (Winter Sweet) so if you are out for a walk in a park or local open garden be sure to look out for them.



More excitingly our meetings will resume on 17th February 2026 and kicking off our speakers for the year is Tim Fuller, co-founder of The Plantsman's Preference in South Lopham. Tim will be sharing his knowledge of ornamental grasses. Many people are unsure of what to do with grasses in the garden and they tend to end up in a bed on their own - not the best way to use them. This talk will aid the selection of good garden grasses and suggest ways to include them in the garden.

We meet every third Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm in the Wesley Chapel, School Road. We have a varied and interesting line-up of speakers and outings planned for 2026. More details to follow.

Whether you are an experienced home gardener or just starting out there is always something new to learn or ideas to take home to your own garden. Non-members are always welcome and you may make some new friends.

We look forward to welcoming you in February and growing another year of shared garden inspiration together.

Councillors agreed this was a time consuming task and not of benefit to the village, and suggested the firm take out an advert in the Messenger.</p>

Mr. Aket commented on the number of road closures around the village. He asked why broadband installers do not need to go through the procedure of application to close roads. Cllr Richardson stated broadband installers and water companies need to notify Highways but only need to give a certain period of notice. He believed that as it is infrastructure below the road they can have legal access at short notice. However, he was unsure why broadband as a planned upgrade could not go through the usual process. Mr. Walton felt dates had been notified but it was short notice and with limited coordination.</p>

Dr. West confirmed to the group that patients would not be turned away even with the increased housing developments. Funding for new patients comes from the patients registering first and then funding requested rather than a request for funding to take a certain number of additional patients.</p>



DOWN OUR STREET

I'm sure that by now, many of you will have seen the new gates at the entrance to St Andrew's Church. These 'craftsman made' replacements are in memory of Alan Taylor (pictured below), who was a lay reader and took many services at Norton. His wife Helen thought it would be a fitting tribute to Alan to have the old broken church gates copied and remade in his memory.



The original ones were made and installed in 1961, remembering the many members of the Lambert family who had been village carpenters and funeral directors since the late 1800s. They had worked from their premises in The Street, where 'Tall Trees' has since been built. The photo below shows the Lambert family at the front of their workshop.



Helen employed specialist carpenter Ali Everett from Borley Green, Woolpit to manage the project and make the gates and posts. Ali has previously made the replacement door for the chancel at St Andrew's, Tostock.


The following photos show how the old gates were removed before being taken to Ali's workshop where all the original pieces of the woodwork and ironwork were dismantled. Wooden parts were marked out onto new pieces of oak ready for shaping and jointing. The original ironwork was removed, cleaned and repainted ready for fitting to the gates. Ali chose beautifully figured oak showing the wonderful patterns of the medullary rays.




As well as power tools, many traditional tools and jointing methods were used in making the gates.



The gates have Ali's monogram and date carved on the back as well as the original dedication plaque to the Lamberts and a new one to Alan Taylor.



If you haven't seen the gates yet, do take a moment to go visit the church and admire the wonderful craftsmanship in person.
