
NORTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN RESULTS

I can't believe I'm writing this article with just one week to go before we break for summer. This half-term has not disappointed—it's been incredibly busy, but full of fun and learning!

Star Class (EYFS) went on their very first school trip to Bradfield Woods as part of their topic Living and Growing. The children became minibeast detectives, using their senses to explore the natural world around them. They had a fantastic time.

Galaxy Class (Year 1) enjoyed a fabulous day at the seaside. They spent time on the beach identifying both human and physical coastal features, as well as walking along the promenade and visiting Martello Park. Planet Class (Year 2) thoroughly enjoyed their topic on Australia, especially learning about the weather and native animals. As part of their Science work, they also visited Holywells Park. The day included invertebrate hunting and classification—children found spiders, ants, beetles, and even a toad! They also took part in a sensory walk and identified various trees and flowers.

Comet Class (Year 3) have been learning about biomes, with a particular focus on ocean environments. They explored the world's oceans, mapped their locations in relation to the continents, and discussed both their importance and the environmental issues they face.

Rocket Class (Year 4) visited the Guru Nanak Gurdwara in Ipswich as part of their RE topic on Sikhism. They learned about the features of a Gurdwara, the principles initiated Sikhs follow, and the rules all visitors must observe. The children were incredibly attentive and respectful throughout the visit. Another highlight for Year 4 was returning home with silver medals after competing in a Multiskills Festival with other local primary schools.

Meteor Class (Year 5) have had an action-packed few weeks. They performed at a music festival at The Apex, participated in Bikeability, and have begun thinking about the leadership roles they hope to take on in Year 6. On Friday 13 June, the whole school took part in our Sponsored Fun Hike—a fantastic morning filled with fun, smiles, singing, and lots of walking! Both children and staff showed great enthusiasm and resilience throughout. To reward their efforts, the children were welcomed back with celebratory ice lollies—a muchappreciated treat on a hot day. So far, we've raised nearly £4,325, which will be shared between Cancer Research UK, Blood Cancer UK, and a seated bench area in memory of Evie Carey.

Sports Day, held on Friday 20 June, was another brilliant occasion. The weather was perfect, and the children enjoyed a variety of sporting activities, including the traditional running races. They encouraged and cheered each other on throughout the day. Afterwards, families joined the children for a picnic on the school field, making for a lovely community event.

Our Key Stage 2 performance, It's the End of the World, was a huge success. The children sang with great enthusiasm, and Year 6 made a perfect cast. The production, written by Mr Mabbitt, featured cleverly adapted lyrics to well-known rock anthems to suit the storyline.

And so, we say goodbye to our Year 6 pupils. They've been a wonderful cohort who have worked extremely hard, as reflected in their recent SATs results. They leave Norton with strong foundations, and we wish them every success as they move on to secondary school.

The Council need to decide whether to upgrade lights with tele cells, leave lights on as currently, or designate areas to upgrade and switch off during specific night hours. 
