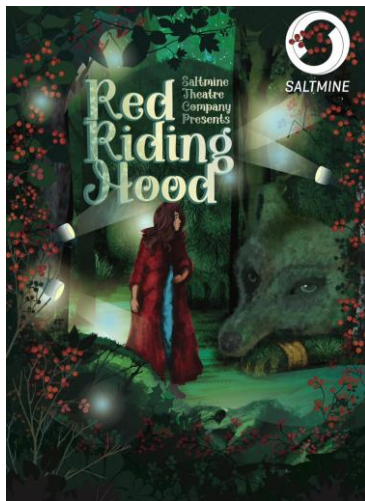

As we approach half term, it's lovely to reflect on what a busy and positive start to the year it has been. The children have settled beautifully into their new classes, embracing new routines and approaching their learning with enthusiasm and confidence. I have been so impressed with their energy and curiosity, which shine through in every classroom.

At this time of year, I have the pleasure of showing prospective parents and children around our school. As I pop into classrooms, it's wonderful to see how focused and engaged the children are in their learning. I am also delighted by how many pupils are keen to share with our visitors what they are learning.

In **Star Class (Reception)**, the children have settled incredibly well and are busy learning letter sounds and numbers. The Early Years outdoor area is being thoroughly enjoyed as they ride trikes, climb on the clamber stack, and explore their outdoor learning space.

Galaxy Class (Year 1) recently visited St Andrew's Church to role-play what happens during a Christening. Reverend Katherine led the service, with the children taking on the roles of parents, godparents, and congregation members. Back in the classroom, they have been thoroughly enjoying their Science work linked to the senses. The children have taken part in several practical sessions using sight, hearing, touch, smell and taste — with the taste investigation proving to be a firm favourite!

In **Planet Class (Year 2)**, the children have been learning about jobs in medieval castles, exploring the roles of lords, ladies, and stewards as part of their history curriculum. In Science, they have studied animals and their natural habitats, using scientific vocabulary to explain how animals are adapted to their environments.

The children in **Comet Class (Year 3)** have been busy creating beautiful *Starry Night* pictures. They followed steps using oil pastels and then applied a colour wash to create a wax-resist effect. In English, they have used some incredible vocabulary after freeze-framing parts of their new text, *The First Drawing*.

Rocket Class (Year 4) have set up an exciting scientific investigation to learn how enamel protects our teeth from decay but can be damaged by what we eat and drink. Using eggshells to represent enamel, they submerged hard-boiled eggs into different sugary drinks (and water as a control). They are looking forward to their next lesson when they will observe and record their findings. As part of their *Rivers* topic, the children enjoyed a lovely walk to the Blackbourne River, where they sketched what they saw and labelled the parts of the river.

In **Meteor Class (Year 5)**, the children have been painting abstract landscapes in the style of David Hockney. They added texture with oil pastels and used watercolours to create stunning patchwork landscapes. The class has also enjoyed several weeks of clarinet lessons with Mr Kershaw, learning about pulse and rhythm, assembling their instruments, and playing notes E, F, D, G, and A.

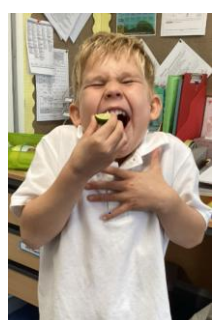
In **Supernova Class (Year 6)**, the children have been investigating the effect of adding more bulbs or cells to electrical circuits. In English, they have written moving refugee poems featuring powerful descriptions and emotive language. Our oldest pupils are also setting a fantastic example to the younger children as line monitors, worship leaders, Sports Ambassadors, and Behaviour Ambassadors.

As we approach half term, there is so much to look forward to. We have our first PE enrichment day — *Quidditch!* — as well as BCY creating a *Prayer Space* in Norton Baptist Church for all groups to visit. Year 6 pupils are also preparing for their exciting residential trip.

This year, our **Bold Adventurers Curriculum Driver** focuses on helping the children at Norton become confident speakers, listeners, and communicators. We have set them six challenges to complete by the end of term, and it has been lovely to see them beginning to achieve these and sharing fascinating facts during assembly.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 1st September 2025

1.	The Chair welcomed members of the Village Hall Committee	
2.	<p>DISCUSSION BETWEEN VHALL COMMITTEE AND COUNCILLORS ON FINANCE FOR FINAL STAGE OF HALL UPGRADE PROJECT.</p> <p>Mrs. Till outlined the costs and increased additional charges. The valuation of £810,000 less the 2.5% retention (plus any VAT) has been paid. The final payment had been negotiated down by the Architect to £825,000. The final bill is due for payment around October/November which will be £15,000 plus the retention of £20,625 plus VAT. Part of the discussion negotiated that the additional £15,000 will be paid after the snagging period. The builder may not come back to sort the snagging problems in which case the retention sum of £20,625 would not be payable. The Hall has funds to cover the £15,000 but not the additional £20,625. When asked about the snagging problems Mr. Walton stated the list would be drawn up by the building project group. He clarified there had been an increase in the specification, not an increase in materials and that had added to the costs. Mr. Aket queried whether when adding various jobs to the original specification at agreed prices the committee had money to pay for these additional jobs. Mr. Walton clarified that some jobs had been removed and savings made, but additional jobs had been added which balanced each other out. Mrs. Walton commented that some jobs were unforeseen, such as the parquet floor rising, the fire alarm requiring a complete upgrade due to new regulations, and some additional blockwork required by the roof changes. The hall is receiving rental income from the coffee shop. Mr. Aket asked whether the regular income will cover ongoing running costs of the hall, and it was felt that hire income will cover budgeted costs. However, the future cannot be guaranteed. Mrs. Fogg commented that the Council had not given the money to the hall for the refurb but had invested it into the community via the village hall and the Committee of volunteers take their responsibility very seriously, and are aware of the large amount of money that has been invested in the Hall. Prof Jaggard commented that if the hall became very successful it may not be possible to run entirely on volunteers in the future. Mrs. Fogg on behalf of the committee put two questions to the Council: a) can the Council help financially, and b) if not what can be suggested. Mrs. Hill stated this cannot be answered this evening as the Council needed to take this further and discuss in Council. Mrs. Walton enquired about the Council financing the wifi, which had been done in the past. This year it is £481.55 last year it was £324.79. Prof. Jaggard felt the Council should be responsible as the VAT could then be reclaimed. The Chair thanked the Committee for this frank and informative discussion and stated the Council would reply in due course.</p>

Mr. Aket enquired about the ongoing discussions of Local Government Reorganisation. Cllr Mellen felt the Government needed to be careful because of judicial review. He reminded of public meetings coming up. Cllr Mellen reminded of the Tour of Britain going through Norton. He stated he has Locality Budget available. When asked why there wasn't a litter pick on the A14 while it was closed, he stated some of this area came under West Suffolk. Mr. Walton commented on road signs being damaged etc, and not being repaired or replaced. Cllr Mellen stated he has a budget that may be able to help. Report from District Councillors Harry Richardson – noted. 	7

A more permanent plan with chain and padlock is being investigated. The car park will present more difficulties to secure as an auto barrier would be expensive.	Mr. Walton
	7.5 Anglian Water- large number of leaks in Ashfield Road. Anglian Water stated they are aware of the condition of the main. Water is now supplied from pumps at Elmswell Water Tower to a closed valve along Ashfield road. However, due to an interruption of supply downstream the closed valve was opened to keep customers on water, but this increase in pressure created further bursts. Road closures are a last resort. The Planning Team are aware of the water mains relay in this area and the issues being caused and will continue to carefully monitor the case. At this time there is no further information but they are committed to working towards a long term solution. Mr. Aket expressed concern about school buses not using closed road and whether CC are aware of closures.

DOWN OUR STREET

Over the last couple of months, several villagers have approached me asking me to write some more 'Down Our Street' articles. I have previously written about Henry and Sophia Eugenie (nee Mingay) Downing's family who lived in the house called 'The Old Forge' (which stood next to The Dog) before it was pulled down and a group of houses was built on the site. You may remember that Henry was a blacksmith and that two of their sons ran a traction engine business, hiring out engines and ploughing machines together with the men to operate them. After WW2 one of the village blacksmiths took over the forge and farrier's workshop. (Recently converted to a house.)

Over the next two months I will look at another branch of the family, that of Henry's son Robert Downing, who lived at Mill Farm in The Street. Robert was born at The Old Forge on 4th March 1854. He grew up working with his father at the blacksmith's shop and eventually became a successful engineer. At the age of 39, on June 5th 1893 he married my grandfather's eldest sister, Elizabeth Alice Burt (she was 29) at St Andrew's Church.

Robert and Elizabeth, who was known by her middle name 'Alice,' had six children in quick succession between 1894 and 1901, namely Ruby, Ivy, Arthur, Florence, Daisy and Frank.

During the First World War, Robert was a generous supporter of The Red Cross and two of his daughters, Ruby and Florence became Red Cross nurses at Ampton Hall. I have just been lent Ruby's war time autograph book with notes, sketches from patients and photos of her ward, so for the rest of this month's article, I will concentrate on her.

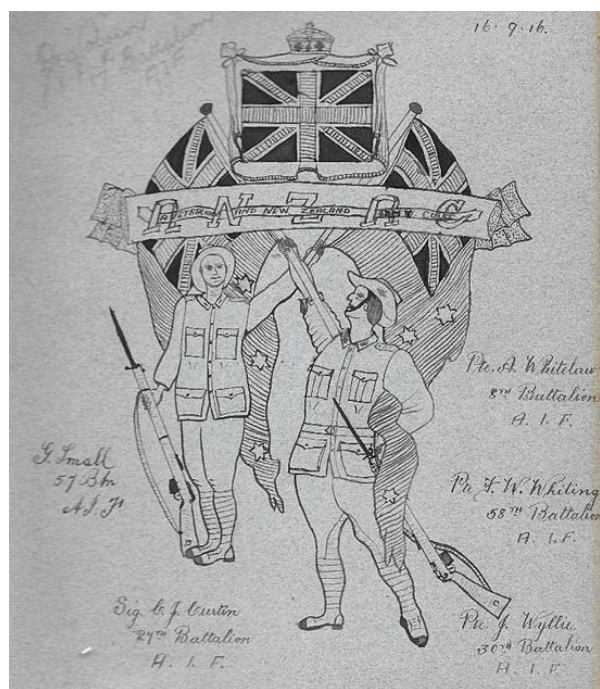
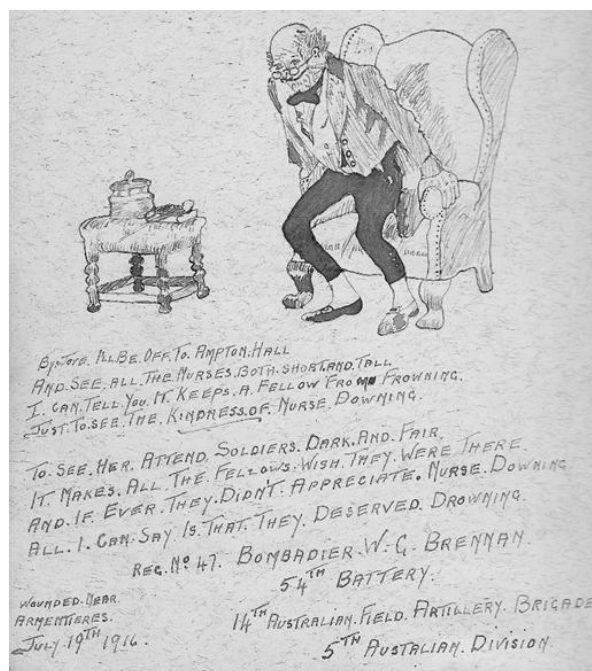
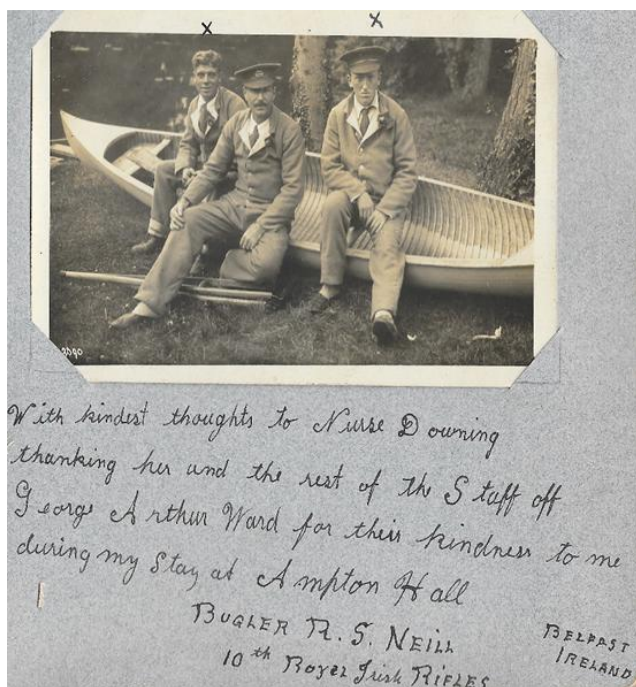

Ruby was a nurse on 'George Arthur' ward (below) from 1915 till the end of the war.



There are entries from British, Canadian and Australian soldiers as the above show. Some had lost hands others were suffering from gunshot wounds, trench foot and pleurisy. After the war Ruby married Rudolph Dutton and lived at 'Quarry House, Stanton Street. She had two children, Robert who lived in Elmswell and Jill who lived in Hawes Lane (deceased this year).
